Krotona Welcomes a New School Director

Krotona School will have a new director in January 2025 with the retirement of Maria Parisen. Taking over will be Ananya Sri Ram, the school's current assistant director who has been actively involved in the school's activities since 2021.

Maria took over directorship of the school in 2009 after the excellent guidance of previous directors Joy Mills, Shirley Nicholson, and Nelda Samarel. She brought with her decades of TS leadership experience at the local and national level with a commitment to harmony in community. Soft-spoken and gentle mannered, Maria has overseen many important changes in the school's programming and technology in these 15 years. Keeping to essential theosophical study has been her primary focus, along with encouraging related programs that appeal to those seeking an interspiritual path of wholeness and healing. Under her guidance, the school's classes have become more interactive, with workshops to help students apply theosophical principles and ideals in daily life. Our theosophical intensives have

expanded with the Partners in Theosophy initiative directed by Pablo Sender, the collaborative biennial Secret Doctrine Forum, and the upcoming series on HPB's Wisdom Teachings. Maria will continue to assist at the school while attending to other Krotona activities.

Ananya hails from a well-known line of theosophical leaders. Her grandfather was N. Sri Ram, fifth international president of the Theosophical Society (TS), and her paternal aunt, who later raised her, was Burnier. seventh Radha international president of the TS. Upon her move to Krotona, Ananya quickly became an integral part of the school's staff. She has been assisting in programming, providing support for the classes, and conducting video recordings. Ananya was President of the Theosophical Order of Service in America, served on the board of the Inter-American Federation of the TS, worked on Quest Magazine while at the national TS center in Wheaton, and is currently editor of The *Krotonian.* Ananya presents programs locally and internationally and is currently serving as President of the TS Ojai Valley Lodge.

Guest House Renovations



The four Kern Guesthouse rooms are getting a much-needed makeover. In March of 2024, in preparation for the Centennial Celebration, the first room was renovated under the watchful eye of Maintenance Manager Jorge Hermosa and with design input from Michele Sender. Two more rooms are scheduled to be renovated in 2025.

Built in 1958 as a donation from Herbert A. Kern, the Guesthouse offers visitors a beautiful view of the mountains surrounding Ojai. Each studio is simple yet comfortable in its furnishings, with its own *Page 2*

kitchenette, small dining area, bathroom and patio. It provides the perfect setting for a personal retreat alone or as a couple.

The updates consist of replacing carpet with modern flooring alternatives, sanding and painting over the dated paneled walls, shelves, and ceiling, updating the fixtures and paneling in the bathrooms, and installing new drapery and mattresses. The upgrades not only brighten the apartments, but minimize allergens for our more sensitive guests, in turn, providing a more restful and restorative stay.

The Guesthouse exterior and car park have also been renovated. The roofs were repaired and sealed, the walls power washed and given a fresh coat of paint, and the old wooden doors replaced with steel doors. Each room is now clearly marked, giving the whole building a warm and welcoming look.

New Resident: Luz Tamarit Ananya Sri Ram

Born and raised in Spain, Luz says that she is 100% Iberian and doesn't know of any family member that isn't from the peninsula. She lost her parents as a child and was raised in a Catholic boarding school. Despite the sad circumstances, Luz states that the consistent schedule of mass at 7 am, regular prayer/meditation, and the structured way of life, opened something within her at a very young age.



She received her teaching credentials to teach elementary school in Spain, but after coming to the US got her Associate in Social Work degree. Her ability as a bilingual speaker has stood her in good stead working at a domestic violence shelter for twenty years, facilitating addiction support groups in both Spanish and English. A family crisis worker, she has worked in hospital and correctional facilities. Today, she works as an interpreter for online therapy groups.

In the late 1990s, Luz would visit the Oak Grove School to attend the Krishnamurti Dialogues. A Spanish teacher from the school introduced Luz to the Krotona Institute. One of Luz's first encounters at Krotona was with Lakshmi Narayan, Krotona

well-known Library's former librarian. She met the Carbonell family while attending a Spanish weekend program at Krotona School and began attending Logia Espana in Los Angeles soon after. At the time, Luz was working at night in Orange County. After getting out of work in the early morning, Luz would drive to LA, sleep in her car outside the lodge building to attend the meetings in the afternoon. She did this for

seven years! She eventually went on to become president of Logia Espana.

"I remember I was always tired, but the Carbonells were such good motivators and Theosophy is priceless. I don't regret anything from that time. It was totally worth it."

When asked about coming to Krotona, Luz's face lit up. "I've wanted to be here for a long time. I was so much into Theosophy that coming here seemed like the perfect way to live. It's a perfect way to study and to keep learning."

Luz is the manager of Krotona Guest House, volunteers in the library, and anywhere else she is needed. Krotona is fortunate to have her.


Work Study Participants Jennifer Montero & Chandler Fournier John Beers

Jennifer is from Spain and is a professional healer. She took her pranic training from Grandmaster Choa Kok Sui, whom she recognizes as her spiritual teacher and who advised her to learn about Theosophy and The Secret Doctrine. She also practices Arhatic Yoga, which includes Raja Yoga, Karma Yoga, Kundalini Yoga, Jnana Yoga, Bhakti Yoga, Mantra Yoga and simplified Hatha Yoga--to build the foundation for Before spiritual development. Pranic Healing, she trained as a nurse and worked at a Cardiopulmonary Critical Care unit.

On a late October afternoon, John Ruth was still at work in our school's Pollinator Garden, setting rocks along a new pathway border. His knit cap, long-sleeved jersey, faded jeans, and worn sneakers were covered in dust. John had been kneeling for hours, setting each rock in place with artistic care.



It had been a long day, one of many he has given with fellow worker Arturo Sanchez, renewing Krotona's garden paths. John recently formed a non-profit, View Points, to provide the design and creation of stonework, pathways, and sitting areas "to bring beauty and color into people's lives." Honoring his late wife, Karen, and sharing her sensitivity to nature and especially to beautiful views, John has donated his services for three projects, covering the cost of all materials and labor.

John, at 79 and retired from the software industry, invites collaboration with great enthusiasm. John experiments, observes, and adjusts the same way he lives, in incremental improvements.

He and John share most details of their projects, from the bigger picture to managing the usual challenges. In addition to assisting John, Arturo works full time for other clients needing skilled interior and landscaping help. His life, from a childhood in Mexico, has been one of helping people in simple ways, fixing what's broken, learning how everything fits together. During sleep, he has dreamed of belonging to a group helping others in need.

We meet lots of other dogs walking, including Mimi with Father Jim, Indy with Marguerite, Charlie with Julie, and Anboo with Anan. We hope to see you soon on a Krotona walk with your furry friend!

My name is Mimi and I am a tov Australian shepherd mix. In 2017, I found two people, Jim and Rochelle Voirol. wandering around the Ojai Humane Shelter. I told one the shelter volunteers: "This couple needs a new dog to take care of them." The

Krotona Library Reorganized & Sparkling Susan Johnson

Over a year ago, Cristin McVey, Borrego Springs Public Library's head librarian, offered insightful suggestions for reorganizing the Krotona library in order to make the entire collection more accessible to users. Cristin's regular visits to Krotona have helped her get a feel for what would benefit our patrons. Her suggestions were implemented in stages that have resulted in wonderful changes to the library's physical space.

The library's encyclopedias and dictionaries were moved to the loft by Ann Hermosa. Ann, a Krotona resident, then catalogued their titles in a binder for easy research and reference. Our Spanish collection was expanded thanks to a number of books donated from the estate of the late Gaspar Torres. Ed Moskowitz contributed funds that made it possible to create four new shelves and to refinish eight others.

Cristin returned in June 2024, to help move most of the library's collection of 8,000 esoteric books. We emptied bottom shelves, created a large new Manly P. Hall section, shifted the J. Krishnamurti section to a more visible location, and consolidated several other sections. We also thoroughly cleaned the books and shelves.

With the assistance of Luz Tamarit, Kern Guest House manager and a library volunteer, Theosophical and biography books were reorganized, thus making additional space for the Blavatsky, Besant, and Hodson collections. Elena Kolesnykova, a work-study volunteer, scoured the veranda and cleaned the magnificent wrought iron front door. She and John Beers, another library volunteer, did the final work of cleaning the biographies section, the shelves containing duplicate books, and the numerous empty shelves that reach the two-story ceiling.

With thanks to the many hard-working volunteers who lovingly tend the library, our jewel of Krotona is reorganized and sparkling. We invite you to come visit!
